

Monroe's Motivated Sequence

Monroe's motivated sequence is a technique for organizing persuasive speeches that inspire people to take action. It was developed in the mid-1930s by Alan H. Monroe. It consists of five steps:

- 1. Attention: Hey! Listen to me, I have a PROBLEM!
- 2. Need: Let me EXPLAIN the problem.
- 3. Satisfaction: But, I have a SOLUTION!
- 4. Visualization: If we IMPLEMENT my solution, this is what will happen.
- 5. Action: You can help me in this specific way. Are YOU willing to help me?


Find Books using the Library Online Catalog

If the book is a print source, you'll be told its:

- **STATUS** Is it available and on the shelves, or checked out?
- LOCATION e.g., Main Stacks, Reference, Reserve
- CALL NUMBER The number on the spine of the book that shows where it is shelved, as well as the subject area.
- No call number information/access via the internet?
- You have accessed an electronic book. E- books are the same content as print books. Read them 24/7 online.
- You need to use your library card number to read them.

Evaluation: Web Sites

If you have an article published in a peer-reviewed online journal, you're good to go.

However...

No content, nor publication standards on the web.

Anyone can publish, and DOFS!

Remember your questions about

Content Credibility Timeliness

Additional questions to ask...

- Does the site link to other credible sources?
- Have cited references?
- Are the author's credentials listed?
- Mission statement/"about us" link for the organization?
- Published by reputable organization's web site?
- Biased? One point of view?
- Personal/monetary gain?
- Commercial ads?
- Poor spelling or grammar?
- Current? Check for updates or copyright date (usually at bottom of page)



Google Scholar Keywords: "Dream Act"
Not all articles are free. Look for pdf format.

Search in **Google Books**, but remember that most up to date books will only offer a "preview." Still, you may learn enough that you want to request the book.


